3. Sharing the Library Story!

An area village is one step closer to having a library to call its own.

As we first told you this past summer, The Village of Elk Mound secured a grant to turn an old laundry mat into a library.

After months of hard work and a few setbacks in construction city leaders say the project should be complete by early April.

"We like to read a lot," sisters Tori and Hailey said. The two say a good book is never far away, but soon finding a great read will be even easier when the Village of Elk Mound writes the final chapter to its new library after years of hard work.

"The revitalization of the downtown area started in 2010. This will kind of be the last piece in the puzzle as far as revitalizing the down town and having it look nice and we are excited for that," Elk Mound Director of Public Works Terry Stamm said. Stamm says they've made lots of progress on the old building, but a cold and snowy winter has thrown them a few setbacks. "When you do construction work in the winter season its exceptionally challenging but I think the most important thing is we have remained positive," Stamm said. Despite the setbacks he says the library should be ready to open by the beginning of April. Around town, people we talked to say they can't wait to see all of the hard work finally pay off. "The building is so darn old and with all the new doors and windows in it now it's shaping up. Everybody is excited about it," Anthony Schrantz said.

Despite all the progress being made here at the building, the village says they are in need of a few extra donations. City leaders say they are planning on holding two book sales later this spring. You can also donate through the village.

The Big Library Read is the worldwide digital version of a local book club, and an opportunity for your library to generate more interest in your digital collection beyond the bestsellers.

How does the program work?

The title will be featured in a prominent location on the Wisconsin Digital Library's OverDrive-powered website at no cost. All card holders can borrow the title at any time during the program to participate in the Big Library Read. The title will expire at the end of the lending period for each user, not at the end of the program. During the Big Library Read program, OverDrive will measure title impressions, views, checkouts, and social media interaction to further its advocacy efforts for libraries in validating the unique and valuable role they play in connecting readers with books and authors. Aggregated data will not contain any personally identifiable information and will be shared with publishers and library associations as well as interested library trade media.

5. Engaging Children with Ebooks Can Aid Literacy

As younger and younger children recognize and use electronic devices as sources of information and entertainment, what is the impact on their literacy skills? Largely a positive one, according to a study printed in the January 2014 edition of the peer-reviewed journal *SAGE Open*. The report examines how different digital tools—an iPad, an iPod, and a tabletop touchscreen computer—capture and hold children's attention to print media delivered electronically.

In the study—Young Children's Engagement With E-Books at School: Does Device Matter?, by Kathleen Roskos, Yi Shang, and Emily Gray of John Carroll University and Karen Burstein of the Southwest Institute for Families and Children—the authors speculate that the "spatial and temporal synchrony" of children looking, listening, and touching while reading may be the "sweet spot" that garners their "attention to e-text in ways that support early literacy experience and learning."

8. Librarypedia: The Future of Libraries and Wikipedia



Wikipedia and libraries connect to one another in a circle of research and dissemination. Wikipedia is becoming the starting point for research for many; it can in turn lead readers back to other sources and encourage them to engage in deeper learning within their library. While in the past, many librarians have encouraged patrons to eschew Wikipedia in favor of library databases and secondary sources, they are now starting to work together, in recognition of the fact that today's students often rely on the Internet and Wikipedia for their initial overview. Libraries are working to make sure they are part of the pipeline so that students following the crowd sourced Wikipedia bibliography back to full-

text references will find libraries as the end point if not always the starting point.
